The history of April Fools Day started in 1713 when Anansi Gregorman III played the first of what became many annual pranks on his unsuspecting brother Wolfgang. These pranks, which started with causing Wolfgang a mild case of food poisoning from swapping out his birthday breakfast with week old eggs, got more and more elaborate and devious every year until it eventually snowballed into gaffs involving the whole town. And so, every April 1st, Wolfgang's birthday, we still today celebrate Anansi's spirit of mischief, misinformation, and mayhem.

Except all of that is a lie. I completely made it up. I only chose the year 1713 because the numbers spell "I LIE" and Anansi is the name of the trickster spider God from West African Folklore who usually goes about tricking other animal spirits like the wolf and the tiger. The actual history of April Fools day is obscure and unknown, but there are references to it in literature possibly as early as Chaucer's Canterbury Tales (1392) or, more likely, a French Poet Eloy d'Amerval who wrote about "April's Fish" in 1508. My favorite early reference to it is from John Aubry who writes about a Fooles Holy Day, the First of April 1698, when several people were tricked into going to

the Tower of London to "see the Lions washed."

At any rate, the usual sense of April Fool's day is that we all want to be the Anansi trickster, and not the fool wolf or tiger. To be the April Fool is negative, and derogatory. No one wants to be the one gotten and everyone wants to be the one who gotchya. But I want to speak up a moment for the fools. It is only our rotten sportsmanship and toxic shame that has given fools a bad name. The better we can learn to be the fool, and be okay with it, when we are gotten, the healthier we will be. My mother taught me at a young age that often the best way to defeat Anansi, is to laugh along with him and enjoy your folly just as much or even more so than the trickster. The trickster's power is only in making you feel small, so if you feel large and laughing instead this power dissolves completely. It is good to practice happy foolishness. What indeed can the trickster do, if you enjoy yourself all the more for being tricked?

Luther also saw something positive in being the fool. One of my favorite sermons that I often quote of his was preached during the season of Lent (probably around April Fool's day) in 1518. Luther writes: "You well know, dear friends of Christ, that I do not understand much about preaching and therefore I shall preach a foolish sermon; for I am a fool and I thank God for it. Therefore I must also have foolish pupils; anybody who doesn't want to be a fool can close [their] ears. This Gospel compels me to take this attitude." Luther not only proudly claims being a fool for himself, but he encourages and demands all of his listeners to be fools as well!

This is because as my teacher Timothy Wengert says:

God is revealed hidden... under the opposite object, sense or experience, God in the brokenness of the cross, the emptiness of unbelief, the guilt of sin. There is here no glory of miracles or of almighty power. Here there is only the foolishness of what we preach...

We worship a foolish, weak God revealed in a foolish, weak book... God is forever choosing the weak, the despised, the neglected—including especially a



weak, despised, and neglected book written by losers for losers—from Abel to Paul and beyond.

To be a person of faith, is to be a fool, because we have been gotchya'd by God. Worked over by the Spirit, and sent out to do foolish things like loving our enemies, serving the poor, and the best trick of all: forgiving the sins of those who sin against us, just as we have been forgiven. Amen. -Pastor Tommy


HOLY WEEK WORSHIP SCHEDULE

At the end of Holy Week this year, we are trying something new at Zion! The Saturday of Easter weekend (April 16th), will be a special service of Easter Vigil. In place of our normal Saturday Evening Parking Lot Worship, we will process as we worship from the parking lot to the fellowship hall and

then into the Sanctuary as we liturgically get closer and closer to the Easter promises on this most holy night. This worship will start at the normal time of 5pm, but it will be a bit longer than usual, so make sure to order your pizzas and plan your meals accordingly for the extra length this service will take. We will start gathered in the parking lot (outside of our cars!) around the new fire where we will bless and light the paschal candle. Then we will follow the paschal candle into the fellowship hall. There, in relative darkness (such as you can make it at 5pm) we will read a series of Old Testament readings telling the history of God's faithfulness to God's people in times of darkness and need. Then, following our first reading from the New Testament, we will process into the Sanctuary, ringing bells and turning up the lights for the Gospel, sermon and Holy Communion as the new Easter dawns. I hope our regular Saturday night crowd and any who are interested will join us for this Vigil.

Dear Northern Great Lakes Synod,

I remember my first time going to Bible camp, where the youth of the church and their friends gather for a week of fun, fellowship, learning, and more. As often happens at Bible camp, the campers were led through a series of team building exercises, one of which was "The Trust Fall." I would guess many of you have participated in this exercise and even as you read this, you're remembering your own experience. Did they catch you? Did you fall to the ground? Did you drop anybody? For those of you unfamiliar with "The Trust Fall," I give you the following description. Imagine you are standing on the very edge of a picnic table, with just enough of your toes on one end to keep you standing on the table and your heels hanging off the edge. You have been instructed that at the moment when you fall back that you are to cross your arms over your chest to keep from flailing wildly and accidently whacking someone in the face or taking out a fellow camper's eye. Your heart begins to race as you watch your fellow campers below the table arrange themselves in two lines. They stand facing each other starting from the edge of that picnic table. Their arms are outstretched in a pattern that alternates elbows and wrists, left and right, from each side of the line. You look down at them at what seems like a very flimsy zippered net of skinny middle school arms. Sure, there's the camp counselor, but that person is not particularly positioned to catch you. Your fellow campers are supposed to catch you...with their scrawny pre-pubescent arms they're supposed to catch you. These fellow middle school campers look up at you, and you can see that they're not so sure about this either. The full magnitude of this action settles into your gut as you realize what this all means, that you're supposed to fall backwards from the discomfiting four-foot height of the picnic table into this bony net of weak, angular wrists and elbows, mere ulnas and radiuses, that you're quite sure will snap and break like dry twigs when your body slams into them. You have never witnessed a trust fall, and you're pretty sure that you're going to get hurt somehow. But the camp counselor assures you that all will be well. You consider stepping off that picnic table, but everyone is looking at you, and you don't want to be considered a coward. So you steel yourself, cross your arms over your chest, and with grim resolve, face forward. You hear your counselor say, "Ready?" and you reply with a conviction you don't feel, "Ready!" Fall away! And through an act of will you let your body fall backward. But really, more accurately, you let go of what's keeping you upright, you let go of fear and apprehension, you let go of all the reasons not to let go. You let your body fall....and you trust that scrawny net of bony prepubescent arms to catch you even as you brace yourself for a spine jarring impact on your tail bone. For a brief, shining, moment, you are airborne. You are in flight. You are weightless, until you feel those scrawny arms catch you, surprising in their strength, their

resolve, to care for you, to keep you safe, and not let you hit the ground. And you are amazed! Euphoric! The adrenaline of that brief act of courage hits you like a wave of joy. You are so relieved...and surprised! Who knew scrawny pre-pubescent arms could work so well together? To catch even a body in free fall? Who knew? In Hebrews 11:1 we read, "Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen." For the past two years, in many ways, we have been in freefall...this untethered descent into the space of the unknown, uncertain of our landing, unsure of the damages and unclear how much we can depend on those we need to depend on. No, the pandemic is not over. No, we have not yet "landed." Yet, God gives us instructions through Jesus the Christ as to how we should line up in order to provide safety for ourselves and others. One of us, alone, cannot provide the needed support, but all of us together, with combined strength and resolve, can work well together, no matter how ill-equipped we might seem. We have Christ's own assurance, that even though we cannot see the presence of God, God is with us. Ultimately, in faith, we trust that God will catch us. In faith, we trust that together, we have what it takes to care for each other and keep each other safe. In faith, we are stronger than we know and braver than we feel. In faith, we have received the promise of God's abiding presence. We may not ever feel ready, and yet, in faith, by the grace of God, we are blessed to "fall away" and feel the love of God in the many arms of the community of faith that seek to catch us.
