Blessed are you, Lord, the God of Israel, you have come to your people and set them free. You have raised up for us a mighty Savior, born of the house of your servant David. Through your holy prophets, you promised of old to save us from our enemies, from the hands of all who hate us, to show mercy to our forebears, and to remember your holy covenant. This was the oath you swore to our father Abraham: to set us free from the hands of our enemies, free to worship you without fear, holy and righteous before you, all the days of our life. And you, child, shall be called the prophet of the Most High, for you will go before the Lord to prepare the way, to give God's people knowledge of salvation by the forgiveness of their sins. In the tender compassion of our God the dawn from on high shall break upon us, to shine on those who dwell in darkness and in the shadow of death, and to guide our feet into the way of peace. -Luke 1:68-79

Zechariah's prophecy-song in the beginning of Luke is so beautiful it is the assigned psalm to be sung (or read responsively) for the Second Sunday of Advent coming soon. So since this new church year is the year of Luke for our Gospel lectionary, that means you will get two Lukan readings for the price of one that Sunday! It may be just because I'm a pastor, and I get really excited about these mundane sorts of things, but I think that's better than any Black Friday deal. Luke is an exciting Gospel to read from this new year, because here is an entire book dedicated to showing us how God is not just in some lofty place up in the sky: but tangibly and really present for you! Luke says time and again how God is down here where we need God the most. Or as Zechariah put it: "In the tender compassion of our God, the dawn from on high shall break upon us (not someone else, or someone more holy than us, but us)! God comes to shine on those who dwell in darkness and the shadow of death, (last I checked, that's you and me) and to guide our (yes our) feet into the way of peace." This Advent Season, we wait, and look with twinkling hope toward the turning of the world, and the coming of the baby Jesus. I think one of the lost arts of our time is that of waiting. We tend to fill our idle moments with screens, candy crush, social media scrolling, or any number of other distractions. But we spend not enough time in holy waiting. If you thought it was exciting that we get two Luke readings soon, wait until you get a load of this other thing I'm excited about: historical word origins! If we trace our modern word wait to its etymological roots, it comes from the Proto-Indo European word weg which had the original sense of "to be strong and lively." Which means, waiting, far from some passive emptiness that we should avoid at all costs, is at its root supposed to be full of life and activity! Waiting is supposed to be a place where we gather strength and hold space in our livelihood for those that are to come. So take a pause with me here, despite (and to spite) the chaos of the world, the Omicron Variant and all the tumultuous roaring about us. And let us breathe, and wait. Let us wait in a strong and lively fashion, for God will surely not tarry in guiding our feet into the way of peace.


