

I lift up my eyes to the hills—from where will my help come? My help comes from the Lord, who made heaven and earth. God will not let your foot be moved; God who keeps you will not slumber. God who keeps Israel will neither slumber nor sleep. The Lord is your

keeper; the Lord is your shade at your right hand. The sun shall not strike you by day, nor the moon by night. The Lord will uphold you during all evil and God will keep your life. The Lord will watch over your going out and your coming in from this time on and forevermore.

-Psalm 121

Grace and peace be unto you from God our parent, and our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, Amen. As many of you warned me, being a new parent is full of many joys and struggles. Our little Zephyr is getting cuter and more joyous to hold every day, and I'm grateful for your flexibility with me as I'm going through the gamut of new parent sleeplessness and schedule fluctuation. But even when baby is at her crankiest, and when even when I'm at my crankiest to match her, I find myself unmoving in my love for her. I take comfort in this psalm that my help comes from the Lord. God will not let my foothold on love and life be moved, and God will watch over my going out and my going in to the land of sleep. God keeps me and restores me and baby and my wife each day for new joys and new challenges. I find that the continuing threat of the Delta COVID variant and the fresh bout of cancellations and restrictions coming back in place can also make cranky each of us even if we're currently getting a full night's sleep and our diaper's aren't nearly as full. That is to say, I can see that this is a cranky time for most people, and if you aren't cranky you are exhausted. It doesn't take a screaming baby during this pandemic for us to be worn out, frazzled, and fed up. As I myself am at a low for energy and wakefulness, I am struggling to find words to say to my colleagues in ministry who are also tired and worn thin. And when I run out of things to say, it is often that I return to the book of psalms for inspiration. So I found myself praying Psalm 121 to myself every day this week. This psalm makes us a promise, and that promise is that God will not shy away from us when we are cranky and fed up. God will never tire being there for God's people no matter how difficult the times, and no matter if we are going out of restrictions or entering into them. Our help comes form the Lord. I don't remember exactly where I learned this from Martin Luther, but one thing I always like to tell people when times are wearisome or difficult, is that it is perfectly okay to rub God's ears in God's promises. One of the best prayers I know is: look God, you promised to be here for me in my distress, now you have to show up! Do it God, be here for your faithful. Watch over us and provide us with the shade, comfort, and rest and restoration that we need. So if you feel God is far away, take that right back to God, and like Ezekiel whose face was like a diamond, harder than stone set to bring God's message to Israel (3:9), so set your face on God and do not let up in prayer. And if you do not have even the strength for that, you can blame God as well for not giving it to you. As here in this psalm God has promised to be our strength and our help and now God needs to do it. For where else could our help come from? Or as we read a few weekends ago as our Gospel text: Lord to whom shall we Go? You have the words of eternal life. (And I would add:) Now speak

them to us, as you have promised, for our ears so badly need to hear the Good News. Amen

Dear Northern Great Lakes Synod,

I wish it weren't so, but here we are again. Covid case numbers are rising and now that we've had a taste of going maskless, it is all the more difficult to pull back. And yet, our own disappointment does not change the reality of our challenges. As scientists and epidemiologists learn new things about this virus, we would be wise to pay attention to their findings.

- 1. The vaccine is effective in reducing the risk of hospitalization and death.
- 2. The Delta variant is more contagious than the original COVID-19 strain.
- 3. Masks are effective in reducing the risk of transmission. The better quality the mask, the greater the protection offered.
- 4. Distancing and being outside are still helpful in reducing virus spread. As always, what is true of one county or community in our synod may not be true for another. This puts the burden of decision making where it has been this whole pandemic, on congregational leadership; pastoral leaders and their councils, to decide when and how to pivot.

My recommendations are the following:

1. Pay attention to what is happening in your community. Make the effort to consult with local health care professionals. Find out what's happening in your local hospital. Be aware of the health of your congregation members and the vaccination/Covid case rate in your

community.

- 2. Consider requiring masks again for in person gatherings
- 3. Continue to distance. Gather outside if possible.
- 4. Get vaccinated, if possible. Wear a mask around children and grandchildren who are too young to be vaccinated.

People of God, we can do this! I know we are weary and wish this would all go away. I encourage you to take a deep breath and strengthen your resolve for more of the same. We are still in the wilderness. We had a nice oasis break, but now we are back in the desert, relying on the Spirit of Christ to guide us, discern our next steps, and when the time is right, bring us out of the wilderness to the place that God will show us. And I encourage you to do your best to give witness to the fruits of the Spirit that are in you: Love, Joy, Peace, Patience, Kindness, Goodness, Faithfulness, Gentleness, and Self control.
