

Strengthen all weary hands, steady all trembling knees. Say to all those of faint heart: "Take courage! Do not be afraid! Look, the Lord is coming, vindication is coming, the recompense of God–God is coming to save you! Then the eyes of the blind will be opened, the ears of the deaf will be unsealed. Then those who cannot walk will leap like deer and the tongues of those who cannot speak will sing for joy. Waters will break forth in the wilderness and there will be streams in the desert. The scorched earth will become a lake; the parched land, springs of water. -Isaiah 35:3-7

In our Adult Sunday School Bible Study we are really good at getting off topic. But I always find something fruitful in our discussions. Recently the question came up: why do we have all this talk about waiting in Advent? Didn't Christ already come? Shouldn't we be focused on the ways that God is already here and at work in our lives? Why do we need this whole season of when we pretend that Christ is still on the way?

Well, hold your horses. Bear with me. Cool your jets, and hang on for a minute. Because there's something profound and counter-cultural about waiting. It is a practice that we seem to get worse at every year. We neglect it so much that we now can't even finish Halloween before we start celebrating Christmas. Some people skip thanksgiving altogether and hop straight into decking the halls and singing Christmas songs as early as November 1st. We just can't wait! We are not

a culture that does well with the concept. We would much rather do anything else. Twiddle our thumbs. Play candy crush. Scroll through social media apps. Anything but wait. We value "being on time" and even praise earliness. We spend so much time in apology when deadlines come and go unmet. But, as if we never learned anything from our childhood parables about the tortoise and the hair, little praise is ever given to those who take their time.

But there's something crucial we lose when we do not wait. When we don't have space in our lives to be bored and expectant. I probably say this every year during Advent: but if we trace our modern word *wait* to its etymological roots, it has the original sense of "to be strong and lively." Which means, waiting, far from some passive emptiness that we should avoid at all costs, is at its root supposed to be full of life and activity! Look lively now, because waiting is supposed to be a place where we gather strength and hold space in our livelihood for those that are to come. And so it isn't that we pretend during Advent that Christ isn't already here. It is that we hold dear and precious the liveliness and strength that there is in a season of waiting.

That's why the prophet Isaiah here talks immediately about strength and courage, comfort and liveliness when they talk about waiting for God. Isaiah prays that our twitching knees as we sit and wait will be steadied. Sure, there are many ways in which God is nearby, and already here in our lives at work: opening the eyes of the blind, bubbling up streams in the desert, and making new life out of the places of death. But this is a work that is begun, not a work that is complete.

And so in Advent we wait with an eye to the parts of these promises that are still on their way into the world. Faith is not about the things already here, and tidy answers and perfect Christmas presents. It's about living with the questions, finding strength in the wilderness, and livelihood in waiting.

So let us not rush to Christmas before its proper time. We will have twelve whole days to celebrate it in the fullness of time, when it starts on December 25th. Let us learn watchfulness and discover the joys of anticipation.

End of Year Giving

Please consider designating a portion of your Required Minimum Distribution this year to Zion Lutheran Church. It is a very easy and tax-friendly way to contribute. Here's how it works. If you are 72 or older and you have retirement accounts (IRA, 401K, TSP, 457), you are required to take a minimum distribution from those accounts or incur a penalty equal to one-half of the otherwise required minimum distribution amount. To contribute all or a portion of your RMD to Zion, all you need to do is instruct your financial institution or adviser to designate a portion or all of your RMD to Zion. The contribution is tax exempt even if you do not itemize deductions for income tax purposes because your financial institution or adviser would not identify the donated amount to the IRS as reportable income in accordance with the tax code. It really is a win-win situation.

Regardless of how you give or how much you give, thank you for your generosity. Your contributions sustain the many ministries of our church. That should make us all feel good.
