

Soon afterwards [Jesus] went to a town called Nain, and his disciples and a large crowd went with him. As he approached the gate of the town, a man who had died was being carried out. He was his mother's only son, and she was a widow; and with her was a large crowd from the town. When the Lord saw her, he had compassion for her and said to her, "Do not weep." Then he came

forward and touched the bier, and the bearers stood still. And he said, "Young man, I say to you, rise!" The dead man sat up and began to speak, and Jesus gave him to his mother. Fear seized all of them; and they glorified God, saying, "A great prophet has risen among us!" and "God has looked favorably on his people!" This word about him spread throughout Judea and all the surrounding country. -Luke 7:11-17

I want you all to be comfortable. That's why I'm going to talk to you about Money. [Wait! Don't leave!] Seriously though, I want you to be comfortable. And the reason that works as a joke, is we really aren't comfortable when we're talking about money. Especially when it is me, the pastor talking about money here on the cover of the newsletter, instead of something more safe, like if we had a council member do a temple talk some Sunday when you can let your eyes glaze over. So if you're going to tune me out, I'm letting you all know up front—this is what my letter will be about: I want to restore comfort, joy and cheer to something that unjustly gives us anxiety: the idea of giving. So it is that I like to look to this Gospel from Luke whenever the question of stewardship comes up. Now you might be scratching your heads and asking, Pastor, what on earth does this story about Jesus interrupting a funeral to perform a resurrection have to do with stewardship? I'm pretty sure money isn't even mentioned in this passage from Luke. Well, stick with me, I always use this passage for Stewardship because I have in mind a complex theological notion about giving. You ready for my complex theory? It's babies. No, that's really it. Babies are my entire complex theology about giving. All giving, whether you are giving time, or your talents, or your money. It all starts with babies. Or more accurately it starts with the relationship between baby and parent. It is an understatement to say: when you have a newborn baby, that baby isn't going to be able to do things by themselves. So, if you want to share life with your child, (and what a joy they are, so why wouldn't you want that?) you have to give things to them. Like milk, and love, and care, and clothes, and so on. The reason you give time, talents, and treasure to your babies is so that you can share life with them! It doesn't have to be more complicated than that. Whenever you give money to something, you are sharing life with those organizations. Whether it's Jack's Fresh Markets, NPR, Lutheran World Relief, World Hunger, The Grind Coffee House, Dairy Kream, Backpack Buddies, or Zion Lutheran, your giving shares life. When we become anxious about our money, and when we start austerity measures and cutbacks, we have forgotten what it is to live as a given people. Every breath you have taken has been because of God and your parents and your community giving to you and sharing life with you. So here's my great pledge drive suggestion: Take a moment, and check if your heart is beating. Are you breathing? Good. Then that's all the reason you need to give. You are alive, and that's worth sharing with

your babies just as it has been shared with you. Just like with babies, Zion Lutheran Church cannot do anything on its own, and that's why we give to the church: to share life with Sunday School, worship, fellowship, bible study, and coffee hour and the like. All the great things that have shared life with us as we gather together, are worth giving for. In this Gospel text, Jesus goes into that place where we are uncomfortable. He interrupts a funeral procession, where all thoughts are on death, the unknown, financial insecurity and what we have lost. And what does Jesus do? He touches the unclean cot with a corpse on it in a radical act of giving. See, the widow in this story is destitute. In Jesus' day women had to rely on men for property, income and life. If your husband died, your sons would have to take care of you. But this Widow only had the one son. And so really there are two corpses at this funeral, literal corpse of the dead son, and the figurative one that is any viable future the widow might have had. In that way, this story is about money after all. And right now, we are in an austere procession of our own. May God interrupt us! We have been leaning hard into our deficit budget, and we're dangerously behind in our giving for the year. As of the end of last month our income less expenses for the year was far in the negative: -\$25,805. So we've got a lot more life sharing we can do with Zion, because I know we have more life in us than what the numbers are showing. But Jesus sees the woman and has compassion on her, and says "do not weep." He walks straight into the funeral procession and then after touching the cot, he gives the resurrected baby back to his mother. Jesus restores life to them both! Is there a better foundation for Stewardship than that? God is at work, constantly interrupting our funeral processions. God sees us where we are in our lives. No matter how broken we might get, God sees us, and walks right into all our uncomfortable anxieties. And there God restores us to life, giving us back to one another and encouraging us to share that life together. All the giving we do is made possible because God first makes this gift to us: we are forgiven, loved, and made alive. May we joyfully do the same! -Pastor Tommy



Highlights of the August Congregation Council Meeting

+In July Zion's total income was \$9,663.99 with expenses of \$15,872.82. January through July income is \$77,020.65 with expenses of \$113,350.87 for a deficit of \$36,330.22.

+We received a thank you letter from the Northern Great Lakes Synod for contributions in addition to our regular benevolence: World Hunger - \$2,472.74, LWR Blankets - \$52.00 and Answer the Call - \$72.39

- +Pastor Tommy reported making seven visits. He officiated at the funeral of Harry Kreuzwieser. He reported that videos from the Churchwide Assembly are available online. He also reported on a variety of upcoming opportunities for adult education and Sunday School.
- +The Worship and Music Committee met on August 3, 2022 to pick hymns for August and September.
- +The Evangelism Committee reported on the Church Picnic, God's Work, Our Hands, Highway Pick-Up and the Ministerial Association's Progressive Dinner.
- +The Finance and Stewardship Committee met on June 21, 2022 to plan the fall Stewardship Drive.
- +The Property Committee reported that the Isabella painting is back and needs to be framed and hung. All fire extinguishers have been recharged and tagged for another year. We desperately need people to trim bushes and weed gardens at church.
- +The Christian Education and Youth Committee met to finalize plans for Sunday School and set the schedule for adult education (Bible studies).

LUTHERAN WORLD RELIEF KITS

Below is a brief description for Quilts & Kits needed for Lutheran World Relief. If you aren't part of Zion's Quilters or a member of Circle but would like to help, please read on. Your willingness to help will be greatly appreciated here at Zion and wherever a need exists.

Quilts--Imagine the comfort that comes with a hug when someone is in a time of deepest need. The simple combination of fabric & thread reach those with some of the greatest needs. Most often LWR Quilts are used to shield against the cold and rain, but they are also useful as simple tents, floor coverings or a wrap to carry a baby on his mothers back.

School Kits

The following items are included in each school kit:

- 4 70 pg. notebooks; no loose-leaf paper
- 5 ball point pens secured with a rubber band
- 5 unsharpened #2 pencils secured with a rubber band
- 1 box of 16 or 24 crayons
- 1 30cm ruler or one with centimeters on one side and inches on the other
- 1 pencil sharpener
- 1 pair blunt scissors

All items are packed in a drawstring backpack-style bag, approx. 14" x 17", with shoulder straps.


Personal Care Kits

The following items are included in each personal care kit:

- 1 bath size towel, dark color
- 2 bath size bars of soap, in original wrapper

Prayer bracelet

Make this craft to help you remember the Lord's Prayer.



What you need:

- Elastic string (12 inches)
- Colored beads (see below)
- Clear nail polish

What you do:

- 1. Knot the string at one end. Add beads in this order: blue, white, gold, green, yellow, red, black, orange
- 2. Tie the ends so the bracelet fits your wrist. Place a dot of nail polish to secure the knot. Trim excess string.
- 3. As you pray, use the bead colors as reminders of Jesus' words (see Matthew 6:9-13):
 - **blue** = the Father
 - **white** = God's holiness
 - **gold** = God's kingdom
 - **green** = the earth
 - **yellow** = wheat (bread)
 - **red** = Christ's blood (forgiveness)
 - **black** = temptation
 - **orange** = God's power to deliver

- 1 sturdy comb remove packaging
- 1 metal nail clippers remove packaging
